LIMERICK HURLING MANAGEMENT HISTORY

The following is a list of Limerick senior management over the last fifty

The team manager/coach only came into use in Limerick in 1977 with the appointment of Noel Drumgoole of Na Piarsaigh, the former St. Vincent's player who captained Dublin when they won the Leinster Senior Hurling Championship in 1961 beating Wexford 7-5 to 4-8 in the final, only to lose narrowly 0-16 to 1-12 by a marvellous Tipperary team in the All Ireland

1970 to 1971: Joe McGrath (Waterford) trainer. Jackie Power (Ahane) coach, Michael McDonnell (Croom), Dan Hickey (Na Piarsaigh), Rory Kiely (Feenagh/Kilmeedy) and Mick Tynan (Claughaun).

2004 to March 2005: Pad Joe Whelahan manager (Birr Offaly).

Limerick looked outside and secured the services of the famous Offaly man. It didn't work, however, and he left during the 2005 National League campaign.

April 2005 to June 2006: Joe McKenna manager (South Liberties). Limerick went back to one of their own, but it listed only fourteen months for the All Ireland and fivetime all star winner as Joe resigned after a big defeat by Clare in the All Ireland qualifiers.

2007 to 2008: Richie Bennis manager (Patrickswell). The former All Ireland medal and all star winner led Limerick to the 2007 All Ireland Final via the qualifiers where they lost to Kilkenny. 2009 to 2010: Justin McCarthy manager (Passage West Cork). It was back to the outside trail as Limerick looked to Cork and a man who had spent seven seasons as Waterford manager. Limerick reached the 2009 All Ireland semi final where they lost heavily to Tipperary. A major controversy erupted at the start of 2010 when most of the top players refused to join the panel after a row over the manner in which several players had been omitted. Limerick ended up fielding a largely second-string team in the

league and championship and made no headway. 2011: Donal O'Grady manager (St.

Finbarr's Cork). Back to Cork again and this time it worked. Donal stabilised Limerick in 2011 and while they lost narrowly to Waterford in the Munster championship and to Dublin in the All Ireland quarter final, the seeds were sewn for a solid future.

2012 to 2013: John Allen manager (St. Finbarr's Cork). Having succeeded Donal O'Grady as the Cork hurling manager at the end of 2004, Alan did likewise in Limerick seven years later and after an encouraging opening season in 2012 he steered them to their first Munster title for seventeen years in 2013 with a 0-24 to 0-15 victory over his own native Cork in the final at Pairc na nGael on 14th July. While Limerick were subsequently seen as favourites to land the All Ireland crown, their championship campaign came to an end following an All Ireland semi final defeat to Clare. While the Limerick County Board had hoped that Denis would remain as manager for 2014, he announced on 9th September 2013 that he was stepping down as Limerick senior hurling manager.

2014 to 2016: T.J. Ryan (Garryspillane), Donal O'Grady (St. Finbarr's Cork) joint managers. In November 2013 T.J. Ryan was named as the new manager of the Limerick senior hurling team alongside former boss Donal O'Grady. After a league campaign which saw Limerick finish second to Cork in Division 1A, Limerick's championship plans were thrown into turmoil when Donal O'Grady resigned as coach on 20th April 2014. Ryan took up full responsibility as manager after the coach on 20th April 2014.

Ryan took up full responsibility as manager after departure of Donal O'Grady, a position he held until 11th July 2016 when he resigned as manager after three seasons in charge following Limerick's 0-19 to 0-15 defeat to Clare in round two of the All Ireland qualifiers on 9th July.

2017 to Present: John Kiely manager (Galbally). Kiely was named as the new manager of the Limerick senior hurling team for 2017 after a meeting of the County Board on 14th September 2016. In his first year in charge Limerick reached the semi finals of the National League losing by 1-11 to 1-21 to eventual winners Galway. Limerick were later beaten by Clare in the Munster Championship before exiting the All Ireland Championship follow ing a three-point defeat to Kilkenny. In his second year in charge Kiely's side won the Munster Senior League and secured promotion to Division 1A of the National League after securing maximum points in their five group stage games. Limerick later narrowly missed out on a place in the Munster Final, however, their third place finish in the new Munster Championship group stage allowed Limerick to qualify for the All Ireland Championship.

Subsequently defeats of Carlow, Kilkenny and Cork secured a place in the All Ireland Final. On Sunday 19th August 2018 Kiely guided Limerick to their first All Ireland title in forty-five years after a thrilling one point, 3-16 to 2-18 victory over holders Galway. On 31st March 2010 Kiely guided Limerick to a first National Hurling League Division 1 final since 2005, a 1-24 to 0-19 defeat of Waterford secured a first Division 1 League title for Limerick since 1997. Limerick later went on to qualify for their first Munster final since 2014. An impressive 2-26 to 2-14 defeat of Tipperary at Pairc na nGael on Sunday 30th June secured a first Munster Senior Hurling Championship title for Limerick since 2013.

While Limerick were subsequently seen as favourites to land their second All Ireland title in a row, their championship campaign came to an end following an All Ireland defeat to Kilkenny. Limerick and Kiely enjoyed their best year ever on the playing field winning their second All Ireland Senior Hurling title in three seasons defeating Waterford in the final o-30 to 0-19 at Croke Park on Sunday 13th December.

Covid 19 Volunteer Group

The Granagh/Ballingarry Covid 19 volunteer group would like to remind parishioners that their delivery service is still up and running.
